Nova Scotia has more than 50 historic African Nova Scotian communities with a long, deep and complex history dating back more than 400 years. February Registration



Registration for the 2024-2025 school year will be taking place during the month of February. If you have a child or know someone in the neighborhood who has a child that will be five years old on or before December 31, 2024, they are eligible for school in September 2024. Early registration is important, as it will be a factor in staffing the school year. To facilitate a smooth registration process,

parents may visit HRCE's website and download the registration form (<u>www.hrce.ca</u>).

TIP: Before you begin, make sure you have the following documents in electronic form (image, PDF or Word document):

• Proof of identity/age with one of the following: birth certificate, passport, immigration papers, or legal adoption papers) if you are new to the HRCE;

•Proof of home address (a recently dated official government or utility document with your current address that includes your name and date, such as water bill, power bill, internet bill, home fuel bill, a tax receipt, property assessment or a mortgage contract); and

•Nova Scotia Health Card or Canadian Province Health Card or, for non-citizens while in Canada, proof of Medical Insurance Information.

Please note: Registration for pre-primary 2024-2025 can take place at any time. If you have a child or know someone in the neighborhood who has a child that will be four years old on or before December 31, 2024, they are eligible for preprimary in September 2024.

*Current pre-primary students attending JWMFT do not need to register again for grade primary. Information has already been sent by current pre-primary teachers to their families that provides some information about the French immersion program. We will be hosting an open house coming up later this month. Please let your pre-primary teacher know if your child will be choosing primary English or the primary French immersion program as soon as possible. This helps inform staffing and class configuration decisions.

Please share this information with your friends and neighbors with children who will be 4 or 5 years old by December 31.

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

Mandatory Emergency Management Drills - Lockdown Drill Practice Next week: The safety and security of our students and staff is a top priority for John W MacLeod Fleming Tower and the Halifax Regional Center for Education. We are committed to implementing a number of measures as part of a comprehensive plan aimed at ensuring our school remains a safe place for our students to learn.

As you are likely aware, our school practices both lockdown and hold and secure drills a couple of times a year as part of our emergency planning/preparedness cycle. During a lockdown drill, classroom doors are secured, and the students remain inside the room until instructed by the teacher to resume their activities. All exterior doors are locked, and no one is permitted to enter or leave the building. In a hold and secure drill, students remain inside the classroom with their teacher, but can resume activity within the classroom. Students are kept inside the school and classrooms when circumstances make it safer to stay in the classroom rather than evacuate. Just as we prepare our students to properly respond to a fire drill, they also need to be aware of the proper response during a lockdown or hold and secure drill. These drills should be treated with the same level of importance as fire drills.

Please be assured that staff at our school will spend time discussing the importance of this procedure with students prior to running a drill. We will also take time after the drill to remind them that it was only a practice and there was no danger. When possible, our School Liaison Officer may assist us in conducting the drills just as the Fire Department assists with evacuation drills.

Please take the time to speak with your son/daughter about this procedure and reinforce its importance. We practice these drills to ensure our school remains a safe place for teaching and learning. Our first drill is scheduled for the end of this week. We will be preparing students this week in advance of the drill. Please contact us if you have any questions about our drills.

RECOGNIZE YOUR VALUE

If temperatures reach -20 or colder, we usually air on the side of caution and remain inside, but again, that depends on the conditions. We thank you for helping us reinforce the importance of dressing appropriately for NS weather.



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Red Means Stop! School Bus Safety Reminder



HRCE has recorded 691 school bus stop-arm violations in Halifax Regional Municipality since the beginning of the school year. This means that motorists have failed to stop for a bus when its red lights were flashing and the stop sign was extended. This poses a serious risk to children and families who may be crossing the road to enter or exit the bus. Drivers may also face a fine and demerit points if caught by police.

Help us spread the word to remind drivers (including cyclists) that it is illegal to drive past a school bus when they see its red lights flashing and stop-arm extended.

Drivers must slow down and prepare to stop in all directions when they see flashing lights – either amber or red in color – on a school bus. This means the bus is planning to stop or may have already.

Here are some safety tips from Safety Services Nova Scotia to keep in mind when waiting for or exiting the bus:

- Stand back from the edge of the road.
- Line up in single file when you see the bus coming.
- Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop.
- Walk, never run.

- Make sure the bus driver sees you if you are crossing the road. Take 10 giant steps in front of the bus before crossing.
- Wait for the bus driver to signal that it is okay to cross.
- Always look both ways before crossing the road and listen for traffic.
- Never cross the road from behind the bus.

Illness in School

Our collective actions protect the collective health of everyone here at school. Please check your child frequently for signs of illness before coming to school and have a stay at home plan for days that your child appears unwell. As expected, we saw a rise of student absenteism in January and want to take extra precautions to reduce those numbers over the next month. We thank you for your efforts in helping to reduce the spread of illness to other students and staff.
